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OBJECTIVE: Locate information for William Harris, who married Lydia Dwyer in Coventry, Orleans County, Vermont, on 29 August 1822.

PARAMETERS: Ten hours for research, analysis, and reporting. Restricted to records available online.

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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

- ➤ William Harris died on 2 April 1836 at Fort Drane in present day Marion County, Florida, while engaged in the Second Seminole War, also known as the Florida War. He is buried in St. Augustine National Cemetery in St. Augustine, St. Johns County, Florida.
 - William Harris enlisted in the United States Army in 1830 and reenlisted in 1835.





Figure 1: Register of Enlistments in the U.S. Army, 1798-1914, 1828 Jan – 1835, A-Z, entry for William Harris, pg. 85; "U.S., Army, Register of Enlistments, 1798-1914," database with images, Ancestry (https://www.ancestry.com/imageviewer/collections/1198/images/MIUSA1798_102878-00089?ssrc=&backlabel=Return : accessed 17 May 2023), image 85; NARA microfilm publication M233.

 (See Figure 1 and Figure 2)
 - o According to a list of those killed or wounded, William died of an unknown disease at Fort Drane on 2 April 1836. (See Figure 3)
 - William's interment record shows that he was buried at Fort Drane, but the United States military moved his remains to St. Augustine National Cemetery in 1907. (See Figure 4)
- According to William's enlistment records, he was born in Coventry, Orleans County, Vermont. (See Figure 1 and Figure 2)
- ➤ I searched multiple databases, but I was unable to locate any information on William Harris's parents.
- Most records for the towns in Vermont are kept at the local level and are not digitized. Locating records for William Harris will require research onsite in Vermont.

BACKGROUND SUMMARY

The following information is a summary of the information you gave to me:

Marriage of William Harris and Lydia Dwyer¹ (See Attachment 1)

- ➤ William Harris and Lydia Dwyer were married on 29 August 1822 in Salem, Orleans County, Vermont.
- ➤ The record is only an index and shows that the actual marriage record appears in Salem Town Records, Book 1, page 107.

1850 United States Census for Lydia Harris² (See Attachment 2)

- Lydia Harris lived with her son Samuel Harris in Coventry, Orleans County, Vermont.
- Lydia was forty-nine years old and born in Vermont.
- > Samuel Harris was twenty-five years old and born in Vermont.
- ➤ Lydia and Samuel lived in the same house with Lydia's daughter, Nancy, and her husband, Smith McKinty, and their children.
- ➤ Lydia and Samuel were the only Harrises living in Coventry, Orleans County, Vermont, during the 1850 census.
- William Harris does not appear with his family, which may indicate that he was deceased.

Lydia Harris' Death Record³ (See Attachment 3)

- Lydia Dwyer Harris died on 12 November 1872 in Coventry, Orleans County, Vermont.
- Lydia was born in Brownington, Orleans County, Vermont.
- Lydia's parents were Daniel Dwyer and Cynthia Wood.

- > Lydia was a widow.
- > Lydia died of "Inflammation of stomach".

1830 United States Census for William Harris⁴ (See Attachment 4)

- ➤ The household shows William Harris as the head of household living in Salem, Orleans County, Vermont.
- The census shows that the household consisted of the following:
 - o William, who was between 30-39 years old.
 - One female was 20-29 years old (most likely Lydia).
 - One female was 5-9 years old (most likely Nancy).
 - o One Male was 0-4 years old (most likely Samuel).
 - One female was 0-4 years old (most likely Margaret).
- ➤ Salem, Orleans County, Vermont, is where William Harris and Lydia Dwyer were married in 1822. William Harris was the only Harris living in Orleans County, Vermont, during the 1830 census. The ages of the members of the household fit the ages of William's wife and children. David Dwyer and John Dwyer appear on the same page as William Harris. This is the correct 1830 census for William Harris.

Analysis

William Harris and Lydia Dwyer were married in Salem, Orleans County, Vermont. They appear in the 1830 census in the same place. In 1850, Lydia lived with her son Samuel and her daughter Nancy in Orleans County, Vermont, suggesting that William had died by 1850. Lydia died in the same county in 1872.

According to the 1830 census, William Harris would have been born between about 1791 and 1800.

<u>Analysis</u>

This army enlistment record shows that William Harris enlisted in Company B, 4th Infantry, in the United States Army, on 4 October 1830.⁵ The document says that he was a farmer, born in Coventry, Vermont, and was twenty-six years old. Our William Harris was the only Harris living in Orleans County, Vermont, in the 1830 census, and his age in the census is very close to the age on the enlistment record, which makes it highly probable that this record belongs to the William Harris we're looking for. The physical description the record gives shows that he was a rather short man, at 5'6 ½", with fair skin, blue eyes, and brown hair. The record also states that he enlisted for five years and mustered out in Key West, Florida.

Analysis

The information in this second enlistment record matches William's 1830 enlistment (see above), even down to the ½" of height.⁶ In this record, his occupation is "Soldier," which fits with the fact that he had been a soldier for five years previous to this enlistment. William mustered out of the 4th U.S. Infantry in October 1835 and reenlisted in Company B, 1st Artillery, on 13 November 1835.

According to the record, William died at Fort Draine [Drane], Florida, on 2 April 1835. This would explain why William does not appear in the 1840 census and why there is no death record for him in Vermont.

Above is a record that shows that William Harris died at Fort Drane of an unknown disease on 2 April 1836.⁷ He had enlisted in Company B, 1st Artillery, in 1835, which makes this the correct record. This would explain why he did not appear in the 1850 census with his wife and children. It also explains why there is no death record in Vermont.

Analysis

This interment record from the United States War Department shows that William was originally buried at Fort Drane, but in 1907, the War Department moved his remains to the pyramids in St. Augustine National Cemetery in Florida.⁸


Military History

On 30 May 1830, President Andrew Jackson signed the Indian Removal Act. This act initiated the forced removal of Native Americans from the states east of the Mississippi River. Most likely, this is what William Harris was sent to Florida to do. The Second Seminole War began in Florida about a month after William reenlisted in 1835.

In her book, *The Armed Medical Department, 1818-1865*, Mary C Gillett wrote, "...In the guerrilla struggle that followed, Army regulars and members of various state units sent to subdue the Seminoles fought in an unfamiliar and dangerous land, 'healthy in winter but sickly in summer; . . . a most hideous region,' where insects and bacteria alike throve and multiplied...For the first five years of a struggle described by one surgeon as an 'inglorious, unthankful and hopeless war,' the high incidence of fevers and diarrhea-like diseases necessitated an end to active campaigning during the summer months." It seems that William probably succumbed to one of these diseases.


Map of Fort Drane

Locating William Harris' Parents and Birthplace

Orleans County and Surrounding Counties

Orleans County was formed from part of Orange and Chittenden Counties in 1792. This would have been about the time that William Harris was born. The map below shows that Coventry is in the north-central part of the county. Greensboro, where William and Lydia's son William lived in 1850 (see below), borders on Caledonia County. Just north of Orleans County is the province of Quebec, Canada. There may be records for William in any of these counties.

1850 United States Census

While Lydia Harris and her son Samuel Harris were the only Harrises living in Coventry, Orleans County, Vermont, during the 1830 census, there were two other Harrises living in Orleans County in 1850: William R. Harris¹⁰ and Moses K. Harris.¹¹

- 1. William R. Harris was Lydia's son, and he was living in Greensboro, Orleans County, Vermont. He was living in the household of Seth and Lucinda Moodmany.
- 2. Moses K. Harris was also living in Greensboro, Orleans County, Vermont. Moses was a farmer born in New Hampshire and was seventy-six years old. His wife, Rachel, was also born in New Hampshire and was sixty-four years old. They were living in the household of Moses and Deborah Hains. Deborah was thirty-four and was born in New Hampshire. Deborah could be Moses' daughter.

Moses K Harris could be related to William Harris. He would have been born about 1774, which makes it possible for Moses to be William's father, uncle, or some other relationship. I would need to do further research to determine if they are related at all.

1840 United States Census

I did a page-by-page search of the 1840 census in Covington, Orleans County, Vermont, and in Greensboro, Orleans County, Vermont. There were no Harrises in either of those towns. I also did a typical Ancestry.com search in the 1840 census for any Harrises in Orleans County, and it didn't show any. Since William died in 1836, Lydia and her children were likely living with friends or family. The 1840 census only shows the name of the head of household, so if Lydia and her children were living with someone else, their names would not appear on the census.

I also checked the 1842 Census of Canada, but there was not a Lydia Harris in Quebec Province either. 13

Probate Records in Orleans County, Vermont

I checked the probate records in Orleans County, which covers the years 1796-1855.¹⁴ William was not in these records. It's possible that he died without any real property, and therefor didn't need a probate.

I also searched an index on Ancestry for Vermont, Wills and Probate Records. ¹⁵ The index had entries for Orleans County from 1780-1970. William did not appear in these records.

Birth, Marriage, and Death Records in Orleans County, Vermont

I checked the database of vital records on Ancestry.com and found several documents for different William Harrises. ¹⁶ The following records fit within the period of our William's approximate birth year and death year.

- 1. William Harris died on 25 September 1849 in Brattleboro, Orleans County, Vermont. ¹⁷ This William was fifty-eight years old, which fits within the window of William's approximate birth year from the 1830 census. His parents were William Harris and Abiah Brooks. He married Jemima Wood on 19 December 1816 in Brattleboro. ¹⁸ However, in the 1830 census, there is a William Harris Junior living in Brattleboro who fits the age range, so this is probably not our William.
- 2. There was also a William Harris, born 17 January 1798 in Vernon, Vermont. His parents were Stephen Harris and Elizabeth. This William married Polly Tyler on 20 August 1818, in Vernon, Vermont. Once again, there is a William Harris in Windham County, Vermont, in the 1830 census who fits this age range, so this is also probably not our William.
